







This gallery is filled with priceless European art belonging to the nation. See great works by artists Botticelli, Da Vinci, Van Gogh and more (see Galleries).




British Museum



for serious musical talent. The first British music invasion had begun. Names such as The Rolling Stones, David Bowie, Elton John.

Queen, The Spice Girls, Oasis, Leona Lewis, Adele and One Direction are among countless UK acts to achieve success on a global scale since.

Meanwhile, January couldn't be a better time to experience the UK's rock and pop pedigree, with exhibitions, tribute shows and live concerts all taking place to celebrate musical talents from the UK and beyond.

The first stop for any visiting rock and pop fan, has to be the *British Music Experience* (p. 42), an interactive exhibition inside The O₂ that tells the story of the UK's global pop and rock influence, from the 1940s

onwards. It also has a collection of memorabilia that includes a Vivienne Westwood bondage suit designed for the Sex Pistols, and artefacts from David

Bowie, Ozzy Osbourne, Dusty Springfield, The Spice Girls and Freddie Mercury and others.

Over the at the Victoria And Albert Museum (p. 47), not only do they have Adam Ant's Prince Charming costume on permanent display in the Theatre And Performance Galleries, but right now you can still catch



a special exhibition Club To Catwalk: London Fashion In The 1980s (p. 47). It looks at how London nightclubs such as The Blitz, Taboo and Kinky Gerlinky became a breeding ground for ideas and a place where young fashion designers could show off their skills. Their creations often ending up being worn by pop stars of the day such as Boy George, Adam Ant and Toyah, whose outrageous stage outfits all feature in the show.

It's not only UK music talent, you can indulge your passion for. Music fans shouldn't miss the *Hard Rock Cafe* (p. 84), which lines the walls of its restaurant with amazing collectables from all kinds of international icons, while just across the road is its *Rock Shop* and *The Vault* (p. 37) there's even more to see. John Lennon's military jacket, Eric Clapton's guitar, Madonna's Jean Paul Gaultier bustier from her 1990 *Blonde Ambition Tour*, are just a few highlights of the collection.

Over at the Barbican Art Galleries, the Pop Art Design (p. 80), is another place to find many rock and pop goodies, from Andy Warhol's iconic banana silk screen print for a Velvet Underground's album cover, to British artist Richard Hamilton's famous print depicting Rolling Stone, Mick Jagger, handcuffed over drug charges in the 60s.

At the National Portrait Gallery (p. 51) a candid photo of filmmaker Richard Lester (Help!) with the Beatles shows Ringo Starr, George Harrison, John Lennon and Paul McCartney in their heyday (p. 11), while on display nearby are artworks created by an American legend with Bob Dylan: Face Value.

One attraction that really let's you get up close to your favourite rock and pop icons,

Veteran British reggae band *Musical Youth* play the Jazz Café (26 Jan, p. 71), and American rockers *Maroon* 5 storm The O₂ Arena (10-11 Jan, p. 72). For even more live gigs, turn to Entertainment and p. 71.



or at least lifelike wax figures of them, is *Madame Tussauds* (p. 33). Pose with likenesses of UK talents like the phenomenally successful One Direction, Adele, Amy Winehouse and more.

If it's live music you're after then London has plenty of that

too from concerts (p. 13) to tribute shows (right). The West End

too is buzzing, with

a range of musical theatre shows paying homage to pop and rock greats. For instance, Beatles fans can experience the 'Fab Four' in action thanks to Let It Be quality (p. 64); a show cum concert at the Savoy Theatre, packed with more than 40 of their hits.

Enjoy the songs of Freddie Mercury and Queen with We Will Rock You (p. 66) belting out anthems like the epic Bohemian Rhapsody, while Irish amateurs give American soul a spin in The Commitments (p. 62).

Our international favourites get a look in too. See Michael Jackson's moves brilliantly recreated in *Thriller – Live* (p. 66), Whitney Houston's

> back-catalogue revisited in *The Bodyguard* (p. 62), and Frankie Valli and the Four Seasons story provide hit after hit in *The Jersey Boys* (p. 64).

If you've ever wanted to be a star yourself, then experience the potential pitfalls as the play *Mojo* takes audiences back to London's Soho of the 1950s and the struggles of one aspiring rock 'n 'roll star (p. 67).

With so much choice, it's not hard to see why London is considered the centre of the rock and pop universe.

Tribute Acts

On 24 Jan, the UK-based music ensemble, Icebreaker, are reimagining early songs by Kraftwerk, the German electronic pioneers, such as *Trans Europe Express*. In the show *Kraftwerk Uncovered – A Future Past*, Icebreaker's live performance will be accompanied by film and this unusual event takes place in the *Science Museum*'s cool IMAX Cinema (p. 47).

More conventional homages taking place this month include:

17 Jan: Mercury at The New Wimbledon Theatre.



Enchanted City

Turn your visit into a fairy tale experience...

teeped in history and still reeling from the magic of Christmas, there's plenty to make you feel like you are part of your own fable as you take in the delights of the capital. If you thought that ice was purely functional, then think again. The London Ice Sculpting Festival proves that, with a little imagination and a lot of talent, frozen water can be fantastical. From 11-13 Jan, Canary Wharf will be glistening with all manner of ingenious shapes, created

in front of your eyes by competitors from around the globe. Watch them wield their chain saws and chip with their chisels as you take in the action (londonicesculpting festival.co.uk).

There are a handful of shows on stage that are sure to entrance you, but hurry – it's your last chance to catch them. Start with the production that calls itself a 'mix of theatre, illusion, circus,

blockbuster movie and rock spectacular rolled into one': Peter Pan – The Never Ending Story (p. 72). Amazing special effects and direction from renowned names including Luc Petit (Cirque Du Soleil) and Geert Allaert (Les Miserables) inject J. M. Barrie's classic story with all the magic it deserves.

Meanwhile, in the classic ballet *The Nutcracker* at the London Coliseum, see what happens when the clock strikes midnight in the Christmas

Musical young girl whose toys come to life, and battle commences between her nutcracker doll, and the Mouse King – all to the soundtrack of Tchaikovsky's famous score (ballet.org.uk).

If you like fairy tales, both good and bad, then the multi award-winning show Wicked The Musical (p. 66) will provide thrills as well as spellbinding songs. Based on Gregory Maguire's 1995 novel Wicked: The Life And Times Of The Wicked Witch Of The West, it's a re-imagined take on Frank

L. Baum's classic story. The Wizard Of Oz. and tells the tale of two young witches who eventually become rivals.

There's no better place to imagine the lives of kings and queens than in the roval palaces around London. At Hampton Court Palace (p. 30), see the recreated Imperial crown of King Henry VIII (pictured). The original was used by all the King's successors down to Charles Luntil the Commonwealth government melted it in 1649.

Elizabeth I was held prisoner here before she became queen. and it saw several executions. but the Tower Of London (p. 37) is also famous for holding precious ceremonial objects associated with





A Brief History

Now an affluent high street, it was a more bohemian King's Road at the epicentre of 'Swinging London' in the 1960s, and the place to buy Mary Quant's eyebrowraising mini skirts. You can still visit a Quant's cosmetics store.

The street again found itself on the cutting-edge of youth culture in the mid 1970s, with punk rock (p. 10-14) and the clothes of influential designer, Vivienne Westwood. Today, shoppers can still visit Vivienne Westwood's original shop.

Famous Residents

Take a peek at the former house of author and playwright Oscar Wilde (The Importance Of Being Earnest). English Heritage's blue plaques mark the places notable creatives lived and worked, including James Bond creator lan Fleming (Dr. No), Bram Stoker (Dracula), composer Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, ceramicist William De Morgan (p. 44), and painter Dante Gabriel Rossetti. For details go to english-heritage.org.uk

Art Exhibitions

Today contemporary artists show at the Saatchi Gallery. Its current exhibitions include New Order: British Art Today II (to 6 Apr) and Body Language (to 16 Mar, saatchigallery.com).

Shopping Heaven

The January sales are the perfect time to find bargains.
The 1.9 mile (3.1 km) road is a shopper' paradise, with both international chains and small boutiques, but Sloane Square



department store *Peter Jones* (part of the John Lewis chain), is a great starting point.

Food And Drink

You'll find a huge variety of places to dine in the area.

Bluebird Chelsea, specialises in modern European cuisine and is housed in a former petrol station.

You'll also find great gastropubs, such as The Cadogan Arms. And don't forget to try award-winning Indian restaurant Chutney Mary (off map. p. 87).

Live On Screen

Alongside the latest blockbuster films, watch live screenings of opera and ballet inexpensively at the Chelsea Curzon cinema. There's the Royal Opera House Live with Marius Petipa's Giselle (27 Jan) at 7.15pm, plus the National Theatre Live's Coriolanus (30 Jan) at 7pm.

Brave New Works

The Royal Court Theatre is famous for innovation and new writers. Head there for a one-woman Samuel Beckett trilogy, Not I, Footfalls, Rockaby

(9-18 Jan. p. 69) starring Lisa Dwan, and Abi Morgan's *The Mistress Contract* (from 30 Jan, p. 67).

A Royal Invitation

When you set foot inside Buckingham Palace, it's like being part of a real-life fairy tale. There are grand staircases, crystal chandeliers and ornate furnishings. It is one of the most famous palaces in the world, but for the British public it's also a place where they can share in the royal family's sorrow and happiness. It's not often you can visit, but you can with the Exclusive Guided Tour Of The State Rooms (to 2 Feb, £75).

During the tour, you can enjoy a glass of champagne and take in the regal sights of 19 state rooms, such as the Throne Room, which is where William and Kate had their wedding photos taken; and an art collection including work by Van Dyck and Canaletto.

It was less than 200 years ago that the palace transformed into what we recognise today. In 1826 the architect John Nash remodelled the townhouse into a palace, and four years later Edward Blore created the famous front facade. The palace contains 775 rooms and has 1.514 doors, Since 1837, when Queen Victoria moved in. it has been the official residence and workplace for the British monarch. The palace has been visited by Prime Ministers; American Presidents, and, of course, 'James Bond', during the 2012 Olympics Opening Ceremony, Buckingham Palace, SW1A 1AA. 020 7766 7300. royalcollection.org.uk. ♦ Victoria. Get Your Skates On

During the Frost Fairs of the 15th century, Londoners would skate on the frozenover River Thames. Now the Thames no longer freezes and the capital's rinks are man-made, but their locations are still rich in history: some of the city's most outstanding monuments providing a romantic backdrop. Somerset House (p. 34) offers skating 'club nights' after dark and Glad Tidings Tuesdays, with pop-up Christmas shops and festive food and drink.

Other historic sites include the Natural History Museum (p. 46), with an extra rink just for kids, Hampton Court Palace (p. 30), and of course the Tower Of London (p. 37). Of the more contemporary ice rink settings, there's Broadgate (broadgate. co.uk/ice. 0845 653 1424), the London Eye (p. 33) and Westfield London (p. 76).



There aren't many places with a more chilling history than the Tower Of London. The castle has been a fortress, a palace and a prison since it was built by William The Conqueror after the Norman Conquest in 1066 - and now the Tower's iconic Yeoman Warders are offering exclusive tours of the grounds during the most atmospheric hours, twilight.

The tour, which starts at 7pm, takes in famous sights including Traitors' gate. where prisoners were brought by boat before their confinement, and the Chapel of St. Peter Ad Vincula, in which the headless remains of Thomas Cromwell and countless unnamed others are buried.

If you're lucky you just might see one of the many ghosts that supposedly haunt the site, be it Anne Bolevn marching cross Tower Green, or the two murdered boy princes holding hands in the Bloody Tower.

Diamond In The Rough

At the start of the 20th century. a group of demolition workers broke through the floor of a building on Cheapside in the City Of London and came across the stuff of dreams. Almost 500 pieces of exquisite iewellery gleamed from inside a hidden box. which have since been identified as late 16th and

early 17th-century gemstones. But these pieces have been shrouded in mystery ever since: who owned the

Hoard, why was it buried, and why was it never retrieved? The Cheapside

Hoard: London's Lost Jewels (to 27 Apr) at the Museum Of London (p. 46) casts new light on the extraordinary cache of iewellery - among the dazzling collection are lavish necklaces, an emerald watch (pictured, left), brooches and scent bottles, from all over the globe. It is the first time the entire Hoard has been displayed since it was found in 1912.

It is now known that it was buried between 1640 and 1666 an approximate date revealed by the Stafford Intaglio, a previously overlooked gemstone emblazoned with the badge of William Howard, the first and only Viscount Stafford, granted peerage in 1640.

The exhibition also reveals some interesting findings about Elizabethan and early Stuart London, including what it tells us about the period's jewellery trade and an insight into past construction techniques.



In Dickens' book Little Dorrit. the title character was christened at St. George The Martvr Church, Built in 1734 it still stands today, opposite Borough Tube station. 

A Different Ball Game

If you want to practise your penalty-kicking skills to be the next Jonny Wilkinson, or find out why William Webb Ellis didn't actually invent the game, head to the newly revamped World Rugby Museum (p. 58).

Located under the East Stand of Twickenham Stadium (pictured, above), which is one of the world's most famous and largest sporting venues, the museum has recently reopened after a complete makeover.

Its newly enhanced galleries now house more than 25,000 iconic pieces of sporting memorabilia – that's the largest collection in the world of rugby-related items. Look out for the engraved silver Calcutta Cup, made in 1879 for just 270 rupees for the tournament played annually between England and Scotland. A century-old braided black velvet cap from the New Zealand team is one of many historic items of clothing. There are also iconic pieces of film archive including past World Cup footage fit for any rupby fan.

An exciting new feature is the fully interactive Play Rugby Zone (above right), where visitors get a chance to try out their own skills, including agility, speed, jumping, scoring a try and of course, kicking prowess. Perhaps it'll make us realise just how difficult it is to get the ball between the sticks! Fans of all

nations will love learning about the origins of this great sport – which has its roots in Rugby School, right here in England.

One thing that all rugby followers are looking forward to next year is the 2015 Rugby World Cup (18 Sep-31 Oct, 2015). England are the hosts and Twickenham Stadium is one of the venues, in addition to the Olympic Stadium and Wembley. For more information on the latest sports events, go to visitlondon.com/events.

The Globe's New Tudor Playhouse

When the life-sized riverside replica of William Shakespeare's Globe Theatre was first planned, it was always intended to include an additional indoor theatre to complement the Globe's open-air 16thcentury Elizabethan design.

It was American film director and actor Sam Wanamaker (father of actress Zoë Wanamaker) who instigated the project, and so it's fitting that the new indoor theatre should be called the Sam Wannamaker Playhouse (pictured inset). It differs from the iconic Shakespeare's Globe because it draws on roofed 17th-century Jacobean designs, and will of course, provide a warm space for productions to be staged during the winter months, when


its outdoor counterpart is closed.Unique among London venues, its structure is made from handcrafted oak. will be lit by hundreds of candles during performances, and provides pit seating for 340 people.

The Playhouse stages its first production this month with English dramatist John Webster's The Duchess Of Malfi (from 9 Jan. p. 67) starring Gemma Arterton (Tamara Drewe), First performed at the original Globe between 1613-14. the play's considered one of the greatest dramas of the English Renaissance. Directed by Dominic

> Dromgoole, the tragedy set in Italy concerns a recently widowed Duchess who marries beneath her class, to the wrath of her family. Dealing with themes including corruption,

incest, the abuse of power and the status of women, and ending in murder, it's a brutal and macabre tale, something that Jacobean theatregoers loved.



Pankhurst: Razor-Sharp Grooming

For a quintessentially English experience that harks back to the classic barbershops of the 1950s and Edwardian gentlemen's clubs, head to Pankhurst London in their shopper-friendly location just off Carnaby Street. An area known as Newburgh Quarter that's increasingly gaining a reputation for interesting fashion boutiques, concept shops, quaint cafés and restaurants, and anything that's a tad different.

Owner Brent Pankhurst has quite a pedigree. He started his career working for Vidal Sassoon in the late 1980s as an eager 17-vear-old, and more recently decided to create his own classic barbershop, but with a difference; it has its own

speakeasy-style lounge room, for those that want to hang out.

Treatments range from a Hot Towel Face Massage (£30) and Classic Wet Shave (£40) to various packages, which at the top end includes a haircut. deluxe shave and friction scalp massage (£125).

With my head shaved bald and a small beard, my barber Adam, focused on a relaxing wet shave with a traditional cut-



throat razor and beard and moustache trim, which, without a word of a lie, left them looking better than they ever have. Apart from looking my sharpest as I stepped into the street, my pampering proved the perfect antidote to the busy day, so I'd heartily recommend a visit.

Incidentally, Pankhurst produce their own range of products, from Aftershave Ice Gel (£24) to Head To Toe Shampoo (£19), so visitors can take a little bit of that grooming know-how home.



Put on your most dazzling jewellery, flashiest party gear and highest heels - or, for the auvs. vour designer ripped jeans - and treat yourself to a night on the town at the new late-night bar and club, Zinc.

It's on the 31st floor of Centrepoint, the landmark building at the corner of Tottenham Court Road and Oxford Street, below Paramount restaurant. It's the latest creation of Paris-born club owner Pierre Condou who launched Paramount in 2008, and whose experience in London's nightlife and dining scenes stretches back 30 years.

The sky really is the limit here. You enter through a beaded curtain and sit back on the snake-shaped velvet chaise longue, taking in the staggering panoramas of London life

below (it's hard to take your eyes off the bright lights of Oxford Street).


Day trips and short breaks around Britain By Jo Caird





Margate was a leading seaside resort throughout the 19th and most of the 20th centuries, its long sandy beaches a major draw for tourists from all over the south-east and London in particular. Today, the town is undergoing something of a resurgence following the opening of the *Turner Contemporary* in 2011. This striking gallery is situated on the seafront on the exact spot where great British painter J.M.W. Turner stayed during his visits to Margate from the 1820s onwards. It celebrates the artist's association with the town — more than 100 of Turner's works were inspired by the east Kent coastline.

A new exhibition, entitled *Paintings By J.M.W. Turner And Helen Frankenthaler*, opens at the gallery this month (from 25 Jan). It juxtaposes Turner's work with that of the American artist Helen Frankenthaler. Frankenthaler, who died in 2011, first exhibited her large-scale abstract expressionist works in the 1950s. Pictured above right is Frankenthaler's evocative oil painting, *Sun Dial* (turnercontemporary.org).





It can carry a cash value for pay-as-you-go journeys and offers cheaper fares. The system is divided into nine zones. Zone 1 is the central London area. Travelcards. and Ovster cards are valid on Underground. Overground, bus, London National Rail services, Docklands Light Railway (DLR), the Emirates Air Line cable car and tram journeys, and offer river service discounts. 


LONDON UNDERGROUND MAP






BUS MAP
