Truth and Memory

IWM London, summer 2014 - March 2015

Truth and Memory will be the largest exhibition and first major retrospective of British First World War art for almost 100 years and will include work by some of Britain's most important artists of the twentieth century. Using artworks drawn mainly from IWM's national collection this exhibition will assess the immediate impact and enduring legacy of British art of the First World War. Truth will explore how artists encountering the front lines experimented with new forms of art to capture the unfamiliar experience of the First World War. Louis Kahn: The Power of Architecture

Design Museum, 9 July - 12 October 2014

The American architect Louis Kahn (1901-1974) is regarded as one of the great master builders of the twentieth century. Kahn created buildings of monumental beauty with powerful universal symbolism. This exhibition encompasses an unprecedented and diverse range of architectural models, original drawings, travel sketches, photographs and films. Highlights of the exhibition include a four-metre-high model of the spectacular City Tower designed for Philadelphia (1952-57), as well as previously unseen film footage shot by Kahn's son Nathaniel Kahn, director of the film 'My Architect'. The exhibition also includes interviews with leading architects including Frank Gehry, Renzo Piano and Sou Fujimoto who discuss the significance and legacy of Kahn's work. The race to determine longitude at sea gripped Europe during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, becoming a focus for serious debate, popular ridicule and single-minded scientific endeavour. Valuable rewards were on offer for whoever could crack the puzzle and Ships, Clocks & Stars presents the ingenious methods and instruments designed to scoop the Board of Longitude's prize and transform seafaring navigation forever. Buckingham Palace, 26 July - 28 September 2014

A number of The Queen's childhood toys will go on display, including a pink tea set in the shape of a rabbit, a set of 'Knockemdown Ninepins' and a wicker pram that the two-year-old Princess Elizabeth enjoyed pushing around the gardens of 145 Piccadilly, her family home until the age of ten.
