Armistice Day Remembrance Service

Whitehall, 8 November 2015

Exhibitions

Alexander Calder: Performing Sculpture

Tate Britain, 11 November 2015 – 3 April 2016

American sculptor Alexander Calder was a radical figure who pioneered kinetic sculpture, bringing movement to static objects. Calder travelled to Paris in the 1920s, having originally trained as an engineer, and by 1931 he had invented the mobile, a term coined by Duchamp to describe Calder's sculptures which moved of their own accord. His dynamic works brought to life the avant-garde's fascination with movement. Continuing Tate Modern's acclaimed reassessments of key figures in modernism, Alexander Calder: Performing Sculpture will reveal how motion, performance and theatricality underpinned his practice. It will bring together major works from museums around the world, as well as showcasing his collaborative projects in the fields of film, theatre, music and dance. Taylor Wessing Photographic Portrait Prize 2015

National Portrait Gallery, 12 November 2015 – 21 February 2016

The Photographic Portrait Prize, sponsored by Taylor Wessing since 2008, is one of the most competitive photography awards in the world and showcases the work of some of the most exciting and cutting-edge contemporary photographers. For the first time, entrants to the competition are being encouraged to submit works as a series – either a group of individual portraits based on a particular theme, or two or more photographs that form a single portrait when shown together – in addition to stand-alone portraits. Previously unseen prints by the award-winning South African photographer, Pieter Hugo, will go on show in the inaugural In Focus display within the National Portrait Gallery's major global photography exhibition. Masters of the Everyday: Dutch Artists in the Age of Vermeer

The Queen's Gallery, Buckingham Palace, 13 November 2015 – 14 February 2016

Twenty-eight of the finest 17th and 18th-century Dutch paintings in the Royal Collection, including Vermeer's 'The Music Lesson', will be brought together in a new exhibition opening this November. The exhibition includes works by some of the finest artists of the day, among them Gerrit Dou, Pieter de Hooch and Jan Steen. Produced during the Dutch 'Golden Age', when the Netherlands was at the forefront of commerce, science and art, these works represent a high point in 'genre painting' – ordinary scenes of everyday life rendered in extraordinary detail. Cycle Revolution

Design Museum, 18 November 2015 - 30 June 2016

The last decade has seen a revolution in cycling, on a scale not witnessed in the UK since the Second World War. This explosion of interest in bicycles is changing the way in which we use our towns and cities. It is driving a surge of craftsman bicycle makers to tailor machines to the precise specifications of their users. Cycling is also a passion, and for many a part of their identity - be it as a stylish way to get from A to B or as a fiercely competitive sport. The Design Museum celebrates the world of cycling this autumn with a major exhibition that will explore every area of cycling, from commuting to Olympic-level competition and will look at where cycling may take us in the future. Samuel Pepys: Plague, Fire and Revolution

National Maritime Museum, 20 November 2015 – 28 March 2016

Samuel Pepys was one of the most colourful and appealing characters of the seventeenth century and witness to the great events that shaped Stuart Britain, brilliantly brought to life in his famous diary. Using the voice and personality of Samuel Pepys, the exhibition will explore and interpret the period from the execution of Charles I in 1649 to the Glorious Revolution of 1688. The exhibition will consist of 200 paintings and objects from museums, galleries and private collections across Britain and beyond, split into seven sections – Execution and Commonwealth, Restoration, King and Court, Plague and Fire, Control of the Seas, Science and Society and concluding with 'Glorious' Revolution'. Bejewelled Treasures: The AI Thani Collection

V&Å, 21 November 2015 – 28 March 2016

Spectacular objects, drawn from a single private collection, will explore the broad themes of tradition and modernity in Indian jewellery. Highlights will include Mughal jades, a rare jewelled gold finial from the throne of Tipu Sultan, and pieces that reveal the dramatic changes that took place in Indian jewellery design during the early 20th century. The exhibition will examine the influence that India had on avant-garde European jewellery made by Cartier and other leading houses and will conclude with contemporary pieces made by JAR and Bhagat, which are inspired by a creative fusion of Mughal motifs and Art Deco 'Indian' designs. Artist and Empire

Tate Britain, 25 November 2015 – 10 April 2016

This exhibition will be the first major presentation of the art associated with the British Empire from the sixteenth century to the present day. Bringing together extraordinary and unexpected artworks from UK collections, both public and private, it will explore how diverse artists around the world responded to the experience of empire. Comprising sculpture, painting and works on paper, the exhibition will examine the role of art in communicating power relations and cross-cultural translation at different periods in British history. It will consider how the empire shaped some of the themes, ways of making and patterns of collecting, which defined British art in the past and which continue to have resonance today. Art and Poster Guided Tours at the London Transport Museum Depot

London Transport Museum Depot, Acton, 27 and 28 November 2015

The Museum Depot houses one of the world's most comprehensive collections of transport posters and artworks. Visitors can immerse themselves in the rich design heritage of London's transport, explore some of the 7,000 posters that London Transport commissioned, and get close to original artworks. In 1908, Frank Pick, publicity officer for the Underground Group commissioned illustrator John Hassall to produce No need to ask a P'liceman, the first graphic poster for London Underground. Under Pick's guidance, the Underground Group and London Transport went on to commission works from some of the world's best known artists including Man Ray, Abram Games and Edward McKnight Kauffer, some of which will be seen during the tour. Julia Margaret Cameron

V&A, 28 November 2015 - 14 February 2016

To mark the bicentenary of the birth of Julia Margaret Cameron (1815-1879), one of the most important and experimental photographers of the 19th century, the V&A will present 100 of her photographs from the Museum's collection. The exhibition will examine her relationship with the V&A's founding director, Sir Henry Cole, who presented the first museum exhibition of her work (and the only one during her lifetime). It will include a number of works given and sold directly by Cameron to the Museum, letters written by Cameron to Cole that reveal her questions on technical and practical matters, and Sir Henry Cole's diary which describes sitting for a portrait by Cameron. The works on display will show Cameron's technical experiments in striving to make highly artistic photographs which she expected would 'electrify you with delight and startle the world'.
