

As vegan food continues to rise in popularity. Neil Simpson eats his way around the capital

love to eat and that's why I live in London - there's nowhere better to do it. After years of scoffing everything this city has to offer. I recently made a radical decision; the animal products industry is one of the largest contributors to global carbon emissions. so now I'm a vegan. In many locations I'd be bored and hungry, but an army of talent is conjuring up culinary magic on London's vegan scene. I interviewed as many of them as possible to provide you with plenty of dining tips - regardless of whether you eat meat or not.

NEIL RANKIN, founder of Simplicity Burger

He made his name as a master of meat at Temper. but this London chef went in the opposite direction with his new Shoreditch burger joint. 'They're hand-made, plant-based vegan patties, using methods that are zero-waste and ingredients you could mostly grow yourself.' Neil says. 'We haven't talked about the ethical side to veganism - it's just about making a delicious burger out of really good ingredients?

Why the switch from steak restaurants? 'I was seeing vegan options in London that were either over-processed. deep-fried and excessively bad for you, or high-end choices, such as Rovi in Fitzrovia,' Neil explains, 'But, for me, there was nothing super-casual that tasted nice.

'I grew up eating Big Macs - I love a Big Mac. What we're trying to do is take something that is really bad for you and the environment and show that you can eat something that tastes just as great, is good for you and the environment and doesn't cost much more.' www.simplicityburger.london

Veganuary might be done and dusted for 2020 but, just like the vegan movement itself, this annual festival is expanding. Toni explains that they are still battling the extra charge applied to plant milks in most London cafés. 'Very few coffee places charge for soya milk now, but businesses argue that oat, almond and coconut milks still cost more to buy,' she says.

'Cow's milk might be cheaper, but the impact that it has on the planet is far greater than plant milk and we all pay the price for that. Customers shouldn't be penalised for wanting an environmentally friendly choice.

'London's AMT coffee stands at train stations no longer charge extra for plant milk; they were one of the first chains to do so. Le Pain Quotidien also encourage people to try plant milk and they have a great vegan range.' www.amtcoffee.co.uk; www.lepainguotidien.com

Drawing in chocoholics from north London and beyond, this Islington café was founded after Juliet spotted an opportunity. 'There was a gap in the market for a chocolate café in general, never mind a vegan one,' says the entrepreneur.

'The chocolate aspect came before the vegan side of things. Mostly, I just wanted to open a chocolate shop and I've been vegan for about 20 years, so I wanted everything to be vegan. I don't want to make a profit from dairy. It was initially about animal rights, then the environment and everything else came.

'Visitors should expect a lot of chocolate! You can have cakes, as well as chocolate in your food, like waffles or a chocolate weekend brunch: we do a black-bean chilli with chocolate in it, based on a traditional Mexican sauce. We also have cocoa nibs on our avocado toast.' www.copperhousechocolate.co.uk

LOUISA DAVIDSON, social media editor for Vegan Nights

Vegan Nights is one of the biggest events held at The Old Truman Brewerv. 'It's a food and drink festival that 4,000 people attend. says Louisa, 'From seitan-filled Philly steak-style sandwiches, to ice cream made with cashews. you can feast on anything and it's all vegan.

'Some of our traders have since moved on to opening restaurants: Eat Chay ("chay" means vegetables in Mandarin) has gone from a tiny stall to having a unit in Shoreditch's Boxpark. I think their kimchi bao buns are the best. www.vegannights.uk: www.eatchau.com

RUBY AMARTEIFIO. founder of Ruby's Bakery

This vegan bakery is one of many reasons to visit Greenwich Market at the weekend, but don't just take my word for it - take it from Ruby. 'There are loads of great vegan food stalls at Greenwich Market. including a vegan pizzeria,' she says. 'When I was younger. I couldn't eat dairy due to allergies. But if I couldn't kill it myself then I probably shouldn't eat it. Ten years ago. you could just make a below-par product and say "well, it's vegan" - now it has to be a great product. www.rubusoflondon.com

ainted your face green, white and orange? Donned an oversized hat and shamrock jumper? Then you're all set for St Patrick's Day. The day (17 Mar) marks the death of Ireland's patron saint, a British missionary credited for introducing Christianity to Ireland.

This year, 75,000 people will mark the occasion by cheering on a parade of floats, marching bands and Irish dancers along a 2.4km route from Piccadilly to Whitehall (15 Mar). There will also be a free festival in Trafalgar Square from noon to 6pm, with street food, craft stalls. roaming entertainers and a live music stage. Little ones can enjoy bubbles and face painting in a family zone on Pall Mall East.

Even if you miss the big day itself, you can still immerse yourself in Irish culture across London. Here are my top 10 spots.

MIGRATION MUSEUM

Start by visiting this museum, which opened in Lewisham Shopping Centre last month. While it's not specifically about Irish diaspora. the centre gives Irish migrants a voice. Read first-hand accounts of travelling by ferry across the Irish Sea in the 1950s, watch film clips and see a tea set inherited through generations. www.migrationmuseum.org/lewisham

IRISH CULTURAL CENTRE

Established in 1995, this centre has a lively events programme, from live music to tea dances. Highlights include *Unveiled* (6 Mar), a dark play about physical, sexual and emotional abuse within the Catholic church. For something happier - you are on holiday, after all - then listen to traditional tunes by violinist Zoe Conway, accordion player







Máirtín O'Connor and guitarist and bouzouki player Dónal Lunny, two of whom have performed with *Riverdance* (8 Mar). Later in the month Réalta, a quintet from Belfast, play pipes, whistles, banjos and a bodhran drum (28 Mar). www.irishculturalcentre.co.uk

This area in north London is nicknamed County Kilburn, as it has the capital's highest Irish population. Pop into the Sir Colin Campbell for a pint of Guinness and chances are you'll get chatting to an Irish person.

The pub's resident band entertains



with traditional Irish folk every Saturday and Sunday night. Visit the Kiln Theatre, which is showing Pass Over (to 21 Mar), a production inspired by Samuel Beckett's 1953 play Waiting for Godot. It follows two young African-Americans waiting for change that will never come. www.thesircolincampbell.co.uk; www.kilntheatre.com

THE TIPPERARY

Top of the morning to you! There's been a pub on this site since 1605, and an Irish one since 1700, making The Tipperary on Fleet Street London's oldest Irish pub. A solid oak bar, beams and wooden panelling run through the narrow space, which has shamrock-mosaic floor tiles and antique Jameson whiskey signs. Traditional Irish music tops off the ambience. www.thetipperarupub.com





WAXY O'CONNOR'S

The Gothic interior of this huge Irish pub may have a pulpit and stained-glass windows, but the atmosphere is far from church-like. Sports fans can watch hurling, football and rugby on big screens, while live music is played every Wednesday to Sunday. For a more relaxed vibe. visit Waxy's Little Sister on nearby Wardour Street. www.waxuoconnors.co.uk

THE PORTERHOUSE

If you think Waxy's is big, then visit this Covent Garden pub, which covers 12 levels.

O CORRIGAN'S MAYFAIR

here! Nearly half of London is green space, so there's no better city to be in this season. From the trees that line the streets to the flowerbeds in the parks, the capital is in bloom.

If you're after a more concentrated dose of fresh florals, head to Chiswick House and Gardens for its 10th annual Camellia Show (from 12 Mar). On display in the Grade I-listed Conservatory will be 33 varieties of the vibrant flower, ranging from vivid pinks, deep reds, crisp whites and striped blooms.

There are also free camellia-themed tours during the show, where a garden expert will guide

Meanwhile, Florimania returns to Hampton Court Palace - King Henry VIII's favourite residence - on Mother's Day weekend (20-22 Mar; p. 39). A celebration of the fine art of flower arranging, the festival will see the King's State Apartments filled with an array of floral displays.

The theme is 'Heraldry', so expect to see arrangements inspired by historic shields. banners and crests from well-known literary works and artworks, including The Family of Henry VIII portrait. Entry to Florimania is included in the palace admission.

This year marks the 25th annual Orchid Festival at Kew Gardens (until 8 Mar: p. 20). Put a spring in your step with a visit to the festival, which this year centres around the wildlife and culture of Indonesia. Did you know that Indonesia is home to at least 4,000 species of orchid? The immersive event will showcase a selection of these beauties, with displays that include an erupting volcano crafted from these exotic flowers.

litz, glamour, decadence and probably a touch of debauchery! This was all part and parcel of belonging to a certain set of London socialites in the 1920s and '30s. Known as the Bright Young Things, the group embodied the opulence of the Golden Age. Think a British Gatsby. Its elite members included writers, artists, poets, designers and aristocrats who all indulged in the excesses of the inter-war vears. Among their ranks was portrait photographer Cecil Beaton, who not only captured them with a keen eye.

A century on from the start of Beaton's long and prolific career, the National Portrait Gallery is celebrating with a major new exhibition: Cecil Beaton's Bright Young Things (from 12 Mar; p. 44). Featuring around 150 works, many of which rarely go on display, the exhibition gives us a first-hand account of a world we only ever really experience through novels or films.

and you can clearly see why he went on to become a Voque photographer. In his ethereal portrait of the actress Anna May Wong clutching a bouquet of flowers, it looks as though she's radiating light while being showered with more flowers. is Beaton's portrait of theatre director George 'Dadie' Rylands as the Duchess of Malfi.



Other notable portraits on show include one of socialite Stephen Tennant - who was called 'the brightest' of the Bright Young Things - as well as the set and costume designer Oliver Messel and modernist poets Iris Tree and Nancy Cunard. Shots of Beaton also appear, both through self-portraits and in photographs taken by others.

Letters, magazines, invitations, scrapbooks and other ephemera offer more fascinating insights into the Bright Young Things, an intriguing mix of high society and the avant-garde.



River racing

ast year when Olympic gold medallist
James Cracknell, then aged 46, pulled
on the deep-blue Lycra of the Cambridge
rowing team, he was the oldest-ever
competitor to take part in the historic
Oxford-Cambridge Boat Race.

What began as a humble race at Henleyon-Thames in 1829, organised by friends at Oxford and Cambridge Universities, has become an annual fixture – barring the two World Wars – since 1856. The stakes are now high and it's taken extremely seriously by both universities.

The women's Boat Race had a rockier start. Founded in 1927, its first race on Oxford's River Isis drew 'large and hostile crowds gathered on the towpath', *The Times* reported. It was only in 2015 that the two were given equal billing.

Thankfully you don't have to don Lycra or be an Olympic champion to enjoy **The Boat Races** (29 Mar). The action-packed day, taking place on a 6.8km (four-mile) route between Putney and Mortlake on the River Thames, starts with the women's race at 3.44pm, with the men's starting gun going off one hour later.

With thousands of people expected to watch, where's the best place to be? If you prefer the waterfront, pick a spot along the route such



as Putney Embankment near the start line, Hammersmith and Barnes mid-course or Dukes Meadows and Chiswick Bridge at the finish. Alternatively, for food and drink stalls, family entertainment plus all the action on big screens, you can head to Bishop's Park and Wainwright fan parks.

If you're in London earlier in the month, watch rowing action on the same course in the opposite direction in **The Head of the River Race** (women 7 Mar, 2.30pm; men 21 Mar; 2.45pm). Rather than a contest between two crews, this sees more than 400 crews on each day from around the world setting off at 10-second intervals. It also shows off the famous Thames in all its competitive glory.

one are the nights when you had to pick from a pint down the pub or a boogie on the dance floor – because now you can battle for points on a high-tech shuffleboard. The team behind Flight Club, a bar with dartboards, is shaking up Canary Wharf with **Electric Shuffle**.

Up to 16 players – eight per team – compete to slide pucks across a shuffleboard: a narrow wooden surface. There are 10 shuffleboard lanes spread throughout and three games to choose from.

Co-founder Steve Moore explains: 'In the Amplifier, players aim to score the highest number of points based on the five score zones on the table. Eclipse requires players to focus their aim on a target between zones two and three; the closer you get, the higher you score. The Territory table is split into hexagons; players then throw their pucks to claim as many hexagons as possible.'

Technology identifies the final position of the pucks and the scores are displayed on a screen. The bar glows invitingly, but if you're focused on a game then you can order food or drink from your lane via a touchscreen.

If you've never played before, fear not as a staff member will show you the basics, and there's a touchscreen to demonstrate the three games on offer before you slide your first puck. It brings out a competitive edge you may never knew you had.

The lengthy bar menu offers plenty of cocktails, wines and beers. Among the British heroes are Wild Beer's salted caramel stout, Magic Rock's gooseberry beer and Symonds cider.

The food menu is just as inviting. Order small plates such as jackfruit croquettes and curry mayo, or pork belly tacos with chilli jam. Ravenous? Then order thin-crust pizzas to share, and end with hazelnut-filled doughnuts. You can also bring the kids in the afternoon – we think they'll love it. 10 Calbot Square, E14 4EY. Those with an adventurous palate should seek out **Moto**, an intimate new Japanese bar that specialises in artisan sake, or rice wine. The name, translating as 'origin', is also the ingredient that kick-starts the sake fermentation process. Perch on a bar stool and a sommelier will advise you; alternatively, try a tasting flight of three sakes or use the menu's tasting notes. Try rare sakes that haven't yet been exported from Japan, some of which have notes of lychee, plum and marmalade. CROESO I CAERDYDD (that's Welsh for Welcome to Cardiff')

There's more to Welsh cuisine than leeks and lamb Nick Smith munches his way around Wales' capital city, Cardiff

ith its dramatic coastline, rugged hills and tumbling rivers. Wales is one of the most beautiful places in Britain. famous the world over for its rugby, poetry and music. And it should come as no surprise that the 'Land of Song' is also the land of good food. because Wales offers a culinary feast of local dishes to tempt the palate.

Despite Welsh cuisine becoming trendy. there's nothing modern or new about it - just a warm, wholesome and welcoming tradition. A thousand years ago, the historian Gerald of Wales wrote 'the Welsh consider hospitality among their first virtues'.

This is never more true than in Cardiff which, at just two hours on the train from London, is the best place to start your exploration of Wales. The Welsh capital city is buzzing with fantastic restaurants and cafés where you can sit back, relax and get to know the flavours of

a land that is as famous for its cooking as it is for its majestic castles and coasts.

In Cardiff, you can try everything that the Welsh kitchen has to offer, from an ancient dish called cawl (the Welsh word for 'soup') to crumbly white cheese from nearby Caerphilly. On the sayoury side. Wales is famous for its leeks (the Welsh have adopted then as their national symbol to wear in their button-holes on St David's Dav) and cockles.

If you have a sweet tooth, there's nothing tastier or more authentic than piping hot bara brith ('speckled bread') fresh from the oven.

or spicy, currant-filled Welsh cakes that vou'll find everywhere from market

cafés to exclusive restaurants. You couldn't do better than having your first taste of this delicacy at the Fabulous Welshcakes bakery in the Castle Arcade. Try a traditional cake with sultanas and nutmeg, or be adventurous and try one flavoured with maple pecan or lime and coconut.

ST DAVID'S DAY (1st March)

The national St David's Dav Parade - a celebration of Welsh heritage and culture - starts at noon on 1 March at Cardiff City Hall.

Welsh folk group Calan join the National Orchestra of Wales to perform traditional Welsh songs and tunes at St David's Hall. More activities take place at St Fagans National Museum of History





THE WELSH BREAKFAST

Start the day with a full Welsh breakfast. It's a favourite with rugby supporters when Wales are playing, but you'll find it served all day in pubs and bars. The Welsh breakfast fry-up, or brecwast llawn Cymreig, is different from the English version, mainly because it is a celebration of coastal cuisine. You'll find shellfish in the form of cockles (often fried in bacon fat) and nutritious laverbread patties (where local seaweed is mixed with oatmeal and then fried), as well as golden Welsh eggs and gallons of the national brew, strong tea.

If you're a vegetarian, try Glamorgan sausages, meat-free and stuffed with cheese and leeks (vegans should head for The Greenery in Cardiff's central market). Plus, there's the option of the old favourite, Welsh rarebit (or 'rabbit'), a take on the 'cheese on toast' recipe which uses spices such as mustard and pepper, mixed with flour and beer. Kick-start your day with your first genuine 'full Welsh' extravaganza at Garlands in Duke Street Arcade opposite the castle.

TIME FOR LUNCH. TIME FOR CAWL

If you really want to eat like a local, you can't go to Cardiff and not have cawl for lunch. It's one of the most traditional of all Welsh dishes and you won't get two cooks to agree on how best to make it. Some say you can only use Welsh lamb, while others say you can put in beef or bacon. You can bulk it out with potatoes, roots such as carrots or parsnips, and plenty of onions. And don't even get. me started on whether you're allowed to season it with salt, pepper, butter or parsley. But one thing is certain: authentic cawl will always contain leeks. The flavour they add to Wales' favourite meal is so important that the vegetable can only be added at the very last minute of cooking. If you want to try this sumptuous stew. head for the Pitch Bar & Eatery, where Paul's Nan's lamb cawl is slow-cooked to perfection for 12 hours and served with grilled cheese on toast (of course).

EVENING EATING, WELSH STYLE

In the evening, you can take your pick. You could try Welsh chargrilled steaks from Cwm Ciddy farm at The Potted Pig, where you can also sample Welsh gin. There's local mussels or salmon at RP Cullev & Co near Cardiff Central Station, aged Welsh beef fillet. at Bully's (the à la carte menu is also available on 'rugby days'), and exquisite modern Welsh produce at Milkwood bistro, where fillet of pollock sits on the menu next to saddle of rabbit. If you've still got any room left after all that food, there are also Cardiff's famous Brains beers and nearby Pendervn Distillery's range of gins and whiskies to try. But that's another story.




